Puss in Boots



What a performance! And we mean that in a good way. We had a great time presenting four sellout shows of Puss in Boots to very appreciative audiences.

Here's a review from Lisa Riggs and former Dame and Prince Charming (though not at the same time; even he isn't that good) Joel Teague.

The Lympstone panto has a wonderful history, and once again it's kicked off the village's festive season in enchanting, uplifting style. It indulged the child in all of us while sniping impishly at current issues – local and global. Not bad for a story going back several centuries!

The closing of the Lympstone Mill in face of competition from the newly opened 'hypermill' was a relatable basis for a story that included everything from hilariously dim doormen and entitled royals to talking cats and – of course – love at first sight across the social divide. Purveyors of magic from either end of the moral spectrum joined hilariously with a fantastic dame, two captivating versions of the titular feline, a charismatic jack-of-all-trades, and an array of wonderfully portrayed characters that somehow made a story about a talking cat gel perfectly.

Younger cast members were as entertaining as food-pilfering goblins as they were as cat-chasing dogs. Seasoned players delivered wonderful performances that had us all laughing and singing along. New and upcoming talent took the opportunities of major parts and made them unforgettable. Songs were strongly delivered with skill and charm to the backing of John Billington's excellent musicianship. The audience were willingly conscripted as part of it all, with singing, clapping and set-piece responses all woven into the performance in the true spirit of pantomime.

The story of the production itself had its own twist, with the usual challenges of an ambitious production accompanied by the mother of all curveballs halfway through the run of shows. After two excellent performances, the news landed just hours ahead of the third, that a major cast member had been taken ill. This prompted an extraordinary and highly effective example of a group coming together to adapt, improvise and ultimately turn a potential disaster into a triumph. The strength of the Lympstone Players family has never been more evident. Particular praise has to go to those who rose to these last-minute challenges so willingly and skilfully. The show did indeed go on, and it was just a different flavour of brilliance.

As always, the professionalism, creativity and sheer hard work of those behind the production allowed the cast to give their outstanding performances. Bruce Ellis's triumphant panto-directing debut was backed by the extraordinary experience and skills of those delivering wonderful scenery, sound, lighting, stage management, costumes and make-up.

Puss in Boots was the perfect tribute to two of the Players' true greats, Clive and Harland, who will be so sorely missed. Their legacy clearly lives on, with a production that left everyone in the best of seasonal spirits.
